

Our Wednesday night discipleship program for Kindergarten through 5th grade is off to a fantastic start! We've had a wonderful time learning and growing together in God's Word.



BOARD UPDATE

On October 13th, the board met for its regularly scheduled meeting. We opened with a devotion and split into groups for prayer. We continued with our review of the principles of Policy Governance, and this month, we reviewed principle 3: Speak With One Voice.

Each month, the board spends time reviewing one of the five ends that we have as a church. As a reminder, the five ends include: Worship, Discipleship, Missional Engagement, Multiplication, and Healthy Culture. This month we reviewed the end of Discipleship which reads: Centerpoint people will be encouraged to work within our spheres of influence to live and love like Jesus, becoming disciples who create other disciples, investing whatever it takes short of sin. The board feels that this end is worthy of continued pursuit both now and in the future of Centerpoint Church.

We want to thank everyone who participated in the survey a few weeks ago at the end of the church service. The results were very informative and, in most cases, Centerpoint follows the national norms. This information is valuable to the board as well as the staff as it highlights our strengths and opportunities. The board will continue to evaluate the information and discuss it again next month, and the staff will use the information to inform our teaching and preaching. Thanks again for participating!

Time was spent discussing the roll out of our capital campaign and the positive response we received during our Covenant Partner meetings the previous Sunday. It will be announced to the full congregation on Sunday, October 19th.

Centerpoint is governed by a process called Policy Governance. As part of this process the board states the limits we have in place for our lead pastor in guiding our congregation. We review a third of these limits each year. During this review, our lead pastor reports if we are following those limitations. Pastor Jamie presented the report, and we concluded we are in compliance on the limits reviewed.

SALT RECAP

If you had wandered into Centerpoint's Worship and Fellowship areas on the afternoon of October 12th, you would have heard a remarkable juxtaposition of young voices praising the Lord mingled with older voices sharing thoughtful life perspectives. During the afternoon, Centerpoint Students were preparing to lead their peers and AWANA students in worship on Wednesday night. In that hour, the worship area reverberated with powerful songs that glorify God and make Christ known.

As the rehearsal finished and students left, the space quieted. Soon after, senior adults had arrived to consider the challenges faced by children, young people, or young adults living life in 2025 and beyond. It seemed to almost be a balancing act—an hour of worship music melting into thoughtful meditation — both are so very necessary.

Our first Senior Adults Living Triumphantly event of the new season was different from most of our previous events, both in setting and in substance. Fellowship and learning are both key objectives of this ministry, and this meeting encapsulated both of these goals.

We began by sharing a meal together of sandwiches, fruit and yummy home-baked desserts. It was all so good! We also shared a devotional time centering on the struggles of young Jacob as described in Genesis 28.

Our guests for the evening were three well-respected guiding lights from our area: Sioux Center school counselors Iver Mettler and Julie Oldenkamp, and therapist Jeremy Koerselman, who joined us on a panel to guide us through discussions of the opportunities and challenges of growing up in today's world.

These three counselors took on some of the toughest topics surrounding children and young people in 2025: mental health concerns, bullying, sexual identity, anger, violence, academic issues, social media, and more. These discussions were riveting, bold, educational, and humorous. We all gained insight into these difficult issues. The panelists closed by sharing ideas how we, as seniors, can be a positive force for good with young people. We were impressed by the importance of the work that these counselors do each day.
